From the Pastor

While I am unsure how many of us expected the restrictions on religious services and social gatherings to be extended, I bet it came as a slight shock to many for the restrictions to be extended indefinitely. The indefinite nature of the provincial government's restrictions adds a fair bit of uncertainty to how we plan our lives right now. Without knowing what will happen in the future, we can only guess when the restrictions will end and when we can come back into Hope Lutheran Church to worship side by side (albeit, still probably two metres apart) once again. The dread of not knowing can grind us down. This will surely come to pass when Easter rolls around. We do not know if we can meet each other for Easter greetings, and it is disheartening. Yet, Easter cannot be undone by COVID or restrictions. Jesus has risen and is alive unto eternity. The hope and joy of Easter cannot be quenched by COVID for the promises gives to us are absolute certainties. Life and forgiveness are promised to us and no undefined, worldly restriction can keep Christ from giving these to us.

Christians have been living with uncertainty from the time of Jesus Christ. When Jesus spoke of when the Son of Man will return and this world will pass away, Jesus said that not even the angels in heaven know the day or hour of this occurrence, nor the Son, only the Father (Mark 13:32). Going way back to the time of Christ, no Christian has known when the end of this world will come about. Of course, many have put forward guesses and suggestions—

even going so far as creating cults to promote false prophesies. Yet, all predictions have come to naught for the Son of Man has yet to descend from the heavens. The end of the world is indefinite to us. We do not know when this will come about, but do you despair over this fact? Not exactly, no. Instead, we stay awake as the Lord has called us to be in that we continue to live in His grace (Mark 13:37). We act in the faith—hearing God's word, confessing our sins, receiving the sacraments—all the while knowing that the Lord can come in the next second. Amen, come Lord Jesus (Rev 22:20). We rather the sin and death promised by this world cease right now and our Lord will join us in the flesh to usher us into his heavenly kingdom. So, what of the government and its restrictions? Should we take joy in knowing that the restrictions could be rescinded any day now so that we can go back living closer to how we want? Well, that is not really my point. In truth, the world will consistently disappoint us with its uncertainties and evils time and time again. I would hardly be worth my salt as a pastor if I pointed you toward this sinful world for a notion of salvation instead of our Lord. Look to Christ and his coming for his salvation. A COVID-cure would be nice for life in this world, be we are more concerned with eternal life. For the past 2000 years the Church has lived in the constant disappointment of this world and its

uncertainties and there is not any chance the world will stop disappointing us. The indefinite nature of the provincial restrictions is simply the newest form of disappointment we have. Our hope is in Christ as it always has been, and we know that he is coming. He is the one who promised us salvation from this world. The world offers no true salvation, only feeble comforts that cannot save us from the guilt of sin or death. Christ gives to us so much more.

Christ promises to us death to sin in our baptisms (Rom 6:3). He promises to forgive us our sins throughout our lives (1 John 2:1). He promises the Holy Spirit to groan alongside us in our frustrations and pain (Rom 8:26). And Christ promises to us a love that will never be taken away from us no matter what happens (Rom 8:35). All of this Christ gives to us in the here and now so that we may live in his grace unto when he returns. The uncertainties of this world can be weathered because Christ remains faithful to us in this world as we look forward to when uncertainty ceases, that is, when Christ descends, and we can embrace our Lord in the flesh as he brings us out of a sin-filled world.

At that time, we are promised more than we have now. We are promised a world without death, sin, or tears (Rev 21:4). To you is promised a body raised from the grave (1 Cor 15:20-22). Your body will be made glorious like Christ's body, free from sin and clothed with immortality (Php 3:21). Christ will shepherd in his kingdom, no longer vulnerable to the evils of the world, but fed the bread of life (Ezek 34:22-23). In the new Jerusalem, you will drink of the water of life without price (Rev 22:17).

Stay awake. The Lord comes to give you all things. The promised time is not yet but he still sustains you by grace from day to day. The day and hour are uncertain, as is everything in this world, but your Lord is sure and certain. You are secure in him.

Now, as we are unable to physically attend worship, I have to make more of an effort to click on the live streaming link, with a hymnal on hand or after having read through this Sunday's bulletin, have marked the readings in my Bible and be ready for Sunday worship. There is no one around to encourage me to be on time for church. Sometimes, I think, I will listen later, but not always make the time during the week to visit Facebook or YouTube to view the video.

I was letting busyness get in the way. I was being a Martha doing up the dishes, preparing a meal or even worse, spending an hour scrolling through my phone. Notes from the Congregation Meeting of Feb 28th, 12pm by Zoom.

13 people were present by Zoom, constituting a quorum.

Pastor Chandler encouraged members to contact him to arrange for a household bubble or individual meeting in the church sanctuary or in their homes for the opportunity to have communion. This would all be done, following safe protocol. He mentioned this, knowing that several households or individuals have not

taken to opportunity to do this for a year. If you have any concerns or requests, please call him. **Theology Tapped In,** led by Pastor, will have its second Zoom meetup, this Saturday evening at 7 pm. Please join the conversation.

The motion to accept the amended 2021 Budget, was passed.

A motion was made from the floor to apply for the Canada Business Account Expansion of \$20,000 (\$10,000 of which is forgivable). The motion was carried, unanimously. It is to make up for the loss of income from the reduction in parking rental income. Consideration for the use of the funds, will be for covering wages, if necessary, or for non-deferrable renovations/repairs. Bert is still researching roofing repair or placement costs.

The LCC connected website is now up and in its beginnings. The office is working to add information as they are able.

2020 income tax receipts have all been issued. If you have any queries, please contact Gaylyn Smale.

A motion was passed to delay the May 2021 election of new Officers for the PPC until May 2022. This was done to better serve the congregation. It will allow the PPC to focus on meeting members needs during the restrictions and to make plans for when the restrictions are finally lifted. The PPC is also looking to make plans, with membership input encouraged, for Hope's focus as we move forward in the next few years.

Pastor suggested that, as a congregation, we should take up a mission project which actively engages the members and gets them involved with various people beyond simply contributing money or goods. In other words,

that we have personal correspondence and long-term interpersonal relationships between parishioners and the people with whom we are in ministry. In this, we would limit the projects to our general area (e.g. Vancouver Island, BC Mission Boat, etc.). Essentially, it is better to rally behind a mission project in which our members take a personal interest in the persons and/or projects. This can still happen at a distance within the Island or the province.

We are also to remember that our church, in itself, is a mission, which continues to need our stewardship support with our offerings, skill sets, and time. It is encouraged that through these times, we support one another and stay connected with the Word and each other.

Pastor closed the meeting with a prayer asking God to help the people of Hope to be in service with one another.

Children's Corner

Why do we have a week called "Holy Week"?

Why would we refer to a week as being holy? The word "holy" means that it is from God. That's why we call the Bible "holy." It isn't just any book. It is God's living Word given to us for our salvation! The same goes for Holy Week. This is "God's Week." This is the week in the Church Year when Jesus actually paid for our sins and won our salvation!

Which days are in Holy Week?



There are particular days during Holy Week that are extra special. During Holy Week we celebrate Palm Sunday, when Jesus went to Jerusalem and people celebrated His arrival; Maundy Thursday, when Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper; Good Friday, when Jesus died on the cross; and Holy Saturday, when we await His resurrection on Easter Sunday!

Why do we celebrate "Palm Sunday"?

The Sunday before Jesus was crucified by the people, they honored and adored Him as their Lord and king with palm branches. We remember this as the beginning of Christ's bitter walk to the cross.

Why did the people honor and adore Jesus on Palm Sunday and then kill Him on Good Friday?

When Jesus rode into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, the people began to praise and honor Him as their king. They believed Him to be a powerful leader who would overthrow the Roman government and restore Israel. When Jesus did not do this, the people wanted Him crucified. You and I know what kind of a king He is. He's a king who came to die for the sins of His people. Wow! What a king!
