From the Pastor

A blessed Easter to you all,

He is risen! He is risen indeed, alleluia!

We joyfully proclaim our alleluias now that Lent has passed and we join in celebrating the resurrection of our Lord. It is in this resurrection that we find comfort and hope because Christ promises us eternal life through it. But I know there might be some of us who are not quite ready to celebrate yet. This is not because they do not believe in the Easter hope placed upon them. The reluctance to celebrate is due to the inability to come together in celebration with family, friends, and everybody else at Hope Lutheran Church.

Right now I must sound like a broken record (and, yes, I listened to records as a kid) since I've mentioned something along these lines just about every newsletter we have had since I became pastor at Hope Lutheran. It has been over a year now since the initial shutdown and ever since we have been living with restrictions of one sort or another. There was a period of a few days when it looked like we could have an indoor service at Hope, but the number of COVID cases climbed too high for comfort. After consulting with the representatives of the congregation (Parish Planning Council and the Board of Lay Ministry), Hope Lutheran is going back to having only online services. Outdoor services are permitted under restrictions, but are not the preferred option until the weather

warms up. We continue online and sorely miss those of us who are unable to join us technologically. Thankfully, there will always be opportunities to connect with your church family online, over the phone, and even through scheduling to have communion inside your household bubble (contact me and we can arrange the date, time, and place).

We are disappointed with the way things are, because the hoped-for indoor services for Easter did not come about but we still have the hope of Christ in the resurrection. That can never be taken away from us. Reflecting on this disappointment after a ray of hope, we are like the disciples of Jesus shortly after the crucifixion.

On the Sunday following Christ's death, two of Jesus' disciples (not any of the twelve) were walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35). They were talking about what had been going on the past few days in Jerusalem. We don't have their exact words or mood, but I think we can guess they were downcast. The teacher they had been following around for quite sometime had been humiliated and killed before their eyes. The disciples hoped this fellow would redeem Israel by driving out the Roman conquerors and the Herodian kings who were not themselves Israelite. The disciples wanted a restoration of Israel's golden age underneath King David with a messiah descended from this great king. With Jesus dead, the worldly hopes of the two disciples were crushed.

Part way through the conversation, a man comes alongside the disciples on the road. The guy is curious what they are talking about and the two disciples are amazed this man has no idea what happened in Jerusalem in the past several days since all of it was loud and public. A week before, there was a parade in front of the city with people throwing coats and palms who were shouting that Jesus is their king. Jesus led speeches and disputes in the temple courts for two days. Crowds moved about the city on Friday to shout condemnations against Jesus and forced him to be crucified publicly near the city gate. Even that day on the Sunday, women in Jesus' company were spreading the news that they discovered Jesus' tomb to be empty and that Jesus was alive again. On this last point, the disciples were a little skeptical since none of the twelve disciples saw Jesus alive.

The man who was listening to this from the two disciples was disappointed that they had not applied their knowledge of the scriptures to what their teacher had been doing. This man then revealed that this Jesus fellow fulfilled many prophecies and must have arisen from death to reign forever over Israel. Had they noticed how Jesus brought the Word of God alive right there in front of them, maybe they would not be as disappointed as they were. They could have hope in the promises of Christ. The disciples were intrigued, so they requested this man accompany them for dinner. At the breaking of the bread, the disciples realized this man was Jesus because the Lord was giving to them the Lord's Supper right then and there. Immediately they went back to Jerusalem and told people that Jesus is alive and they had seen him.

Like the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, we might focus too much on how our hopes have been disappointed to see the true hope we have and its unfailing promise to us. As Jesus revealed the scriptures to those disciples, all we need to do is turn to the Bible and see our hope in Christ. Jesus foretold that there would be famines and pestilences before the end of this world (Luke 21:11) and right now we face economic downturns and the coronavirus. These are difficult to live through, but Christ points us ahead to when he comes again (Luke 21:25-28) when he will destroy this world and usher in the new heavens and the new earth. The evils of this world will end and we will be delivered from it all through our resurrection hope in Christ. You are not lost. You remain on the road, not to Emmaus but to salvation, on which Christ has placed you.

To remind you of your hope in Christ, he also points you to his sacraments. Jesus broke bread in the Lord's Supper with his disciples to reveal himself to them, and he breaks bread with you in communion wherein you receive salvation in his body and blood. Although we cannot come together as an entire congregation to receive the body and blood in the bread and wine, you can make appointments with me to receive them. It is an honour for me to do this for you.

The disciples on the way to Emmaus thought of Jesus lying in the tomb, instead of the promise of the resurrection; and we might dwell on not being able to worship at the church instead of the hope of Christ's coming and the life Christ supplies you in word and sacrament. But whatever situation we are in, Jesus will continue to care for you and raise your heart from sorrow to life.

For Easter this year, a hymn that seems so fitting is 'Onward Christian Soldiers'. We continue to hope for safe, inside worship services, and in the meantime, we will march on.

What About Outdoor Services?

Hope Lutheran Church is only livestreaming worship services at the present time but outdoor services are permitted to be held. This would allow us to serve communion to the entire congregation and allow us to worship together.

Why are we not holding outdoor services at this time? After careful consideration, there would

be a lot of difficulties involved. While we would be able to worship together, there is no social interaction allowed under provincial restrictions because socializing is a major cause of virus transmission. We can see each other, but the restrictions say any socializing before or after the service is not allowed. Also, the two options available for outdoor worship are sitting on chairs or sitting in cars. Sitting on chairs requires providing rented tent coverings. The church has one small tent canopy, but this will probably be used to protect any musicians playing for the service. Sitting in cars might be preferred to protect you from the weather, but this provides the difficulty of providing sound. An amplifier for our sound system might not be the best solution considering we are in a residential area. A better method of providing sound would be using an FM transmitter which would broadcast the service on the car radio. However, as was pointed out to me, listening on the radio in the church parking lot might not be a great improvement over watching the service at home on a computer. There is also the negative effect of needing the cars to run their engines for the radio and heater. This costs gas and is none too friendly for to the environment. Another drawback is that many people in our congregation will not come to outdoor services because they are unable or cautious about COVID. An online service would still be needed for them. The screen used for livestreamed services will not work in sunlight and the projector for the screen can be damaged by rain. Hope would need to record a service before hand to post online in addition to having an outdoor service, but since we need an online service anyways, it would make more sense to simply choose the online services.

Considering all this and more, it was decided that outdoor services would not be the best option for now. The primary benefits would be in-person communion and fellowship, but we cannot have fellowship in line with the provincial restrictions and any household bubble can schedule to have private communion with the pastor at any time. Outdoor services are definitely still an option, but it would be better to wait until the weather is warmer before we try to have these services. In the meantime, we continue as we have before with online services and fellowship with one another over the phone.

Please feel free to share you opinions about outdoor services (yay or nay) to the pastor.
