From the Pastor

With Easter now behind us and flowers blooming all around us, I think we can safely declare that we are living in the time of Spring. Admittedly, I am not quite used to this. Coming from Alberta, this would be the time of year when you expect a snowfall any day now. There is usually at least one major snowfall in May. The white stuff still litters the ground in April, although there is often a thaw where the snow gradually disappears...followed by an overnight freeze to encase the streets in ice. There is a continuous bounce back and forth between warm and cold in which you lack certainty about what is going to happen next. At least in my first Spring in Victoria, there does not seem to be this level of uncertainty in the weather. Thankfully, the weather doesn't give us too much uncertainty, although we still live in uncertain times.

We might assume that our general situation on Vancouver Island might remain constant, but the current situation of no indoor church services and changing provincial restrictions is not something we want as certainties. The gradual increase in coronavirus infections was also unwelcome, but the increase in vaccinations throughout the province has lowered the infection rates in the past couple weeks. This gives us some hope. The viral variants might give us some concerns, though. Looking forward in time, mindful of the good and the bad around us, we can say that we are still living in uncertainty right now.

Yet, whatever time brings, we will always have Jesus Christ with us. As we persist throughout time as the Church founded upon baptism and the teaching of Christ's words, Jesus will be with us just as he promised. He says, "Behold, I am with you to the end of the age." (Matt 28:20) This can give us confidence because Jesus is with us as we face unknown challenges and blessings. Whatever may happen with in these uncertain times, Jesus will neither leave us

nor forsake us. He remains as our Saviour who is devoted to delivering us from all evils of this world. He rose from the dead after all. There are not many things more difficult than that. Perhaps ascending to heaven is more difficult, but Christ did that too.

When Jesus announces he will remain with his disciples to the end of the age, he does so after his resurrection. The disciples know how their Lord broke free of his three-day-prison and now walks among them. Beyond a reasonable doubt, Jesus will follow through on his promise to them. They don't just have Jesus' word on this but also God the Father's promise. The whole of Jesus' speech is: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to therefore and make disciples nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matt 28:18-20)

God the Father who has authority over the whole of creation has given this authority also to God the Son. The authority with which Jesus speaks is not of some man but the authority of God Himself. As the Lord controls all things, so Jesus proclaims he has authority to control all things. Part of the exercising of this authority is Christ ensuring that he is with us always. We will never suddenly find ourselves without Jesus. He remains with us. Of this we can be certain.

When the whole of creation seems like chaos—or, at least, when our lives seem chaotic—Jesus gives us the certainty that he is alongside us through all of it. Nothing in all of creation is outside of his authority, so nothing can rip us from the love of Christ. As you look forward in uncertainty to the things in this world, in Christ you have the certainty of his presence.

In this last year of turmoil, sorrow, death, separation, isolation, and loss or in a year of Lent, as our Pastor, describes it, this is God's promise as we fear, love and trust in the Lord. During Lent, we say this Verse after the Epistle Reading,

"Return to the Lord, your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love."

God gives us a physical demonstration of His love, on Good Friday, when His Son, Jesus, went to the cross. Jesus willingly laid down His life for us, to forgive all our sins. His death was with mindful purpose. Jesus defeated death and rose again to everlasting life to be our Intercessor with God. He rose to keep the promise that He made in, Matthew 28:20. "And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

While on the cross, Jesus turns to the thief, who asks for remembrance, and says, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise."

In the funeral services, that I have attended over the years, there is one significant difference between a gathering to remember a person, whose life has ended and the service for a faithful servant of God. The first speaks only of the past; the second of time in continuum or without end. In faith, we are separated for a period of time from our loved ones (until we meet again), but never from God. And, in that, "Peace have the that passes understanding and keeps our hearts and minds in Christ."

We mourn and will continue to grieve for, each in our own way, several of our sisters and brothers in Christ. They are members of our own families or of our Christian family. With many of them, close family and friends have been able to physically or by phone or Zoom, gather around their loved ones. For those who have not able to do that, we keep them in our

prayers and continue to contact families to express our sympathies and love. On speaking with people before they have been "called home, to be with Jesus", they have expressed peace that they feel, knowing they will spend the rest of eternity in God's Loving Arms. Through these expressions of faith, each one of them is witnessing to their families and to all of us, of their confidence in God's Word; in the assurance spoken of in Psalm 136, "God's steadfast love and mercy endures forever."

The people of Hope, your brothers and sisters in Christ, pray for all who have recently lost loved ones. Be at peace that they are now with their Saviour. We also ask you to pray for one another for the loss of our brethren.

Please God, comfort all of us as we grieve for these people, many of whom, we have been in Christian fellowship for years. Each one of us are like stones dropped in a still pool of water. Our lives ripple out in community with the people around us. When the waves stop, we all mourn the stillness. God be with us all. Amen.



What is "Pentecost"?

The word "Pentecost" (pronounced PEN-tuh-kost) comes from the Greek word *pentekostos* which means "fiftieth." Exactly 50 days after Jesus rose from the dead, the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples in the form of flames of fire.

Why is Pentecost so important?

When Jesus died, the disciples were sad

because they thought that their friend and Lord was gone forever. But Jesus rose again! Forty days after His resurrection, Jesus did finally ascend into heaven leaving the disciples below. However, before Jesus actually died, rose again and ascended into heaven, He made a promise to His disciples that He would send the Holy Spirit to them. He said that the Holy Spirit would come and guide them "into all the truth" (John 16:13). Jesus doesn't leave us alone to fend for ourselves. Jesus is here with us, and the Holy Spirit guides and leads the Church into the truth of the wonderful Gospel! We celebrate and remember this at Pentecost.

Stain Glass window in the Sanctuary




