

## From the Pastor

God's peace to you,

Indoor, in-person services will now be held beginning on June 6. It has been a long time but we can finally come together once more. The last time Hope Lutheran Church was able to do this was November 15. For the past six and a half months, it has felt like we have been exiled from corporate worship, but our good and gracious Lord never abandoned us. Even in the worst of times, He gives grace and support to us; and we certainly need Him to do this. The past year and a half since COVID-19 come about has been hard. Losing our ability to worship together in one building has added to the hardship. Yet we see some hope around us. We can truly thank the Lord for all that He has done for us and can look forward to speaking His praises within the walls of Hope Lutheran.

O God, you are my God; earnestly I seek you; my soul thirsts for you; my flesh faints for you, as in a dry and weary land where there is no water. (Ps 63:1)

The life of the Christian is fraught with a longing for our Lord. The truth of God's Word reveals to us just how horrible this fallen world is. Evil and pain is obvious to everyone inside and outside of the Church, but the Law of God showcases the depths of depravity in the world. God calls what is evil to be evil, and what is good to be good. And it is certainly the case that it is not good for man to be alone (Gen 2:18). Our separation from each other in worship these past six months not to mention the separation from many other delights of life—has been a great evil. And the recognition of evil is paired with a longing for the Lord because He is the source of all good.

What God creates is by definition good (Gen 1:31) because God is goodness itself (Mk 10:18). Any longing for goodness is ultimately a desire for God and what He does for us. Because we are in the faith, we know the source of goodness is God Himself. Our need for goodness and love and truth and beauty is a need for God because He is the source of all these things. Being deprived of good things, it feels like being in a dry land without a lick of water to parch the tongue. God has been constantly supplying His grace and mercy to each and everyone of us (like having a never-ending canteen in the desert), but we imagine just how hard it would be to be without His goodness by looking around at the broken and hurting world.

So I have looked upon you in the sanctuary, beholding your power and glory. (Ps 63:2)

Thankfully, part of the broken world has been healed so we may correct an evil that this world has dealt to us—the evil of being separated from each other at Hope Lutheran. Now we can enter into the sanctuary of the Lord to behold His power and glory working among us. The Lord works His goodness into us through His Word and His Sacraments. Outside of the sanctuary of Hope Lutheran, we still had God bespeaking us righteous and not sinful, as well as God preserving us within our baptisms. Yet the fullness of this grace seemed to be a little lacking—not in the sense that any grace of God is insufficient for salvation, but in the sense that we did not have every opportunity to receive grace upon grace which we would normally have in the worship service.

The grace upon grace of God is not only prayer and devotions in our homes, but the corporate nature of faith brought among us here in the Church. The entire Church of God is united in the body of Christ so we are always spiritually together, but we desire that the body of Christ to also be physically together. Part of this is receiving the physical body and blood of Christ in the earthly physical elements of bread and wine. This is done in the flesh in the company of fellow believers. Witnessing the forgiveness of our brothers and sisters in the worship service brings its own kind of joy among us. Similar to how we pray, "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us," we desire all to be saved and live in the forgiveness of Christ.

Because your steadfast love is better than life, my lips will praise you. (Psalm 63:1-3)

This steadfast love of the Lord that He works among His people is better than life for it gives to us a life that is eternal—a life that is not just for us alone but for all the children of God. For this we wish to praise our God Almighty who sustains by His love. Make no mistake, this will still be difficult for the next few months. Our worship services will not be able to have singing for a while and not everyone will be able to come join our voices just yet. People in our congregation will be cautious and remain in their homes for a while longer. Their voices will still praise the Lord from their homes together with our voices in the Spirit, although separated due to distance. But this is another reason to thank the steadfast love of the Lord. He does not abandon us or isolate us but unites all of us in the body of Christ. When we come together to praise Him for the love and grace He has given to us, let us also pray that He preserve and protect those of us whom we cannot see right now and allow them to join us when they are able.

Let us praise the Lord in His sanctuary and pray for the care and comfort of those who cannot.

## A Note About Indoor Worship Services

There are some rules that we need to follow when we come back into our sanctuary at Hope to praise our Lord. The provincial government has outlaid a four-phase plan for reopening, so hopefully all these restrictions will not be needed once we enter July, but we will keep you posted. Here are the things that need to happen:

- Preregister for each service you plan to attend through email (<u>helc@shaw.ca</u>) or by phoning the church office Wed. and Thurs. 10am-2pm (250-592-4124).
  - Let us know if you plan to attend every Sunday and we will keep you on our preregistration list so you do not need to phone every week.
- Wear a face covering at all times when you are inside the building, including during the service.
  - The usual exceptions like infants and breathing problems apply to this rule.
- You must go through a brief health check questionnaire upon entering the church. Ushers will be asking you questions for our records such as if you have experienced any symptoms of sickness.
- Upon entering the building, please sanitize your hands with either the alcohol pump at the entrance or wash your hands with soap in the washroom.

- We cannot sing during the service, but you are free to hum the tunes of the music and meditate on the lyrics of hymns.
- There cannot be any socializing in the church building before or after the service (and not during, either).
  - We can gather in groups of no more than ten people after the service outside of the church to socialize. You should not be travelling from group to group if you do.

There are a lot of regulations, I know, but we were following most of these before from July to November 2020. The end is in sight for the pandemic and we do not want to cause any unnecessary risks to one another's health.

If anyone is uncomfortable with attending Hope Lutheran in person at this point in time, Hope will continue livestreaming services on Sundays at 10:30am. Individual communion for household bubbles is also still available by appointment (contact Pastor by phone, email, or Facebook). Even if you cannot join us at the church building for worship at this time, we still want you to be part of Hope Lutheran Church.

## *Our Father, Who art in Heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name*

Pastor Chandler's Lenten services followed the theme of Covid-

captivity. This captivity is still in effect, but release is coming.

During a state of captivity, there are many reasons to grieve. We are separated from families, faced loss of family and friends, limited in our daily routines, and interrupted from services and products that were previously accessible. We are still not able to care for others in the same way; we are not able to grieve those "called home". Brothers and Sisters at Hope are separated from each other in person to person fellowship and/or from worship service, other than through digital means, though the end is near.

Even though Jesus commanded us to love one another, we are limited in the traditional ways that we can presently care for each other.

The month of May is Caregivers' Month. There has been much in the news and other media about caregiving, caregivers and the continued strain and drain on the mental health of all people. The new phrase to describe this is, "compassion fatigue". Sadly, even though, we as Christians, are well equipped with the Words of the Bible (Matthew 11:28-30 "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light.") and Jesus' many examples of how to show compassion and love, we are still showing signs of this fatigue.

When Jesus was told by his disciples, that John the Baptist had been killed and buried by his disciples, "He withdrew by boat privately to a solitary place. Hearing of this, the crowds followed him on foot from the towns." Matthew 14:12-13 In verse 14, Jesus, even in the time of his own grief, showed compassion for the people who had followed him to the distant shore. "When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them and healed the sick."

Jesus suffered as we suffer, so that we know the breadth of his care and sacrifice for us. After the Lord's Supper, that Jesus gave to his disciples in the Upper Room at Passover, they went to the Mount of Olives. From there, they went to the Garden of Gethsemane. Jesus asked them to stay and keep watch while he prayed to his Father in heaven. And, Jesus said to them, as he began to, "be deeply distressed and troubled. My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death." Mark 14:33-34

Jesus had compassion fatigue, as defined by Lisa Petty, PhD in Caring for the Carer, an article in Alive, May 2021. There, symptoms of burnout described, include: fatigue, emotional overwhelm and irritability ("Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep watch for one hour?" Mark 14:37). In compassion, though, Jesus then said, "Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation. The spirit is willing, but the body is weak." On the third time, Jesus has regained his composure to face the events to come. He was now at peace with his Father and what he must do for the sake of all his people.

Jesus suffered everything that we suffer, and much more as he gave his life for us, to redeem us with his death and resurrection. He sets out our path and gives us the equipment to do his Will.

With each hardship, that we endure in our daily lives, we can trust that Jesus is beside us, listening to our prayers, watching over us, and guiding us along the path of righteousness. Jesus has abundant compassion for us. He will give us rest.

He has given us rest this past year. In some ways, 2020 was difficult, a year full of sadness and restraints. In other ways, though, we were given

the means to have more time to reflect, to reassess, to be calm, and to pray. We had time to pray for mercy, but also say prayers of thanksgiving.

Now, we are thankful, as we are being given the vaccines that we need and church attendance is opening up to in-person worship services. God is merciful. He is not giving us more than we can handle. The Lord is compassionate and He gives us peace.

We begin and end, each day, with prayer, " Our Father who art in heaven, "

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us, and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.
