From the Pastor

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ. (Php 1:2-6)

This is how Paul begins his letter to the saints in the church in Philippi. Paul is absolutely joyous to be speaking with those who share in the grace of God. Paul came preaching and teaching so many would be brought to faith and encouraged within that congregation. The joy Paul has is knowing that, whatever affliction he may be experiencing, the saints in Philippi are assured of their salvation in Christ.

Although Paul was the preacher, the Lord was the one doing the good work within the people. The people were not in a partnership with one another because they put their heads together and said, "Let's get things done!" The people are partnered in the Gospel because God united them in faith so everyone receives the same gifts of forgiveness, life, and mercy. The partnership of all people in the Church of God is based on God's grace freely and continuously given to us. God makes us partners by always supplying us with what we need in the faith. You can find joy for others in the faith because the same grace you receive from God is found within them.

The greatest grace we have received is salvation from sin, death, and the devil through Jesus Christ, our Lord. This was first given to us when faith was awakened within our hearts by the Holy Spirit. Yet, we are not currently residing in heaven. We remain in this world with its troubles and its ills. Paul himself was writing to the Philippians while he was troubled in prison. But all of us in the faith possess

the assurance that the salvation we have received will be brought into fulfilment at the day of Jesus Christ, when he returns to this world and brings heaven along with him. All of us share in his salvation, in this faith, and in this hope. My hope is your hope, and your joy in Christ is my joy in Christ.

The joy of Christ's salvation is not quashed by evil. His salvation already overcame evil on the cross. So, we who participate in this salvation also spread the joy of Christ to others that they may not sorrow over the evils in their lives, but rejoice that salvation from evil is already assured. We may not know what others are experiencing at this holiday time (happiness, sadness, or loneliness as only a few examples) but we can continue blessing the saints with our greetings which speak the good work of God: grace in Jesus Christ.

This newsletter features the Christmas greetings of the saints at Hope Lutheran made in joy. May you too experience the joy that comes with the partnership in the Gospel of salvation.

Greet every saint in Christ Jesus. The brothers who are with me greet you. All the saints greet you, especially those of Caesar's household. The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. (Php 4:21-23)

Advent Greetings to All...

As pre-service music for the Advent 1 Worship Service, I played the organ prelude and chorale of what I feel is one of our most beautiful Advent hymns: O Lord, How Shall I Meet You. This hymn is perfect for the joy that comes with expecting the coming of Jesus, and the wonder that comes along with waiting for his love to arrive! Though the hymn is an advent hymn, it does cover many topics of Christ, including when Christ would leave this world. The voice of the text is one that is humbled and is one that comes from an introspective point of view. During this time of Advent, it is important for us to look inside and see what it is we can do to honor and worship Christ. Sometimes, it is as simple as asking Christ in prayer to show you how, but sometimes, we need to sit back and listen to the words that Christ is telling us through our lives. As the third stanza says, Christ will always come to people in their darkest hour, and he will raise those people up to the glory that is only possible through Christ. Christ came so that we can trust that God will help us through our times of trial, and that we will always have a place to turn when we are in the darkest parts of our lives. The verses of this hymn were written by Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676), a Lutheran pastor, and the tune was written by his friend Johann Cruger (1598-1662), who served as a musician with Paul Gerhardt in ministry. Take a moment to read the verses of this truly beautiful hymn #334. May your Advent season be blessed, may it bring joy, may you find peace in your heart, and may you find

time to 'look inside and see what it is you can do to honor and worship Christ'.

Children's Corner

What is Advent?

Advent marks the beginning of the Church Year. Advent is made up of the four Sundays that come right before Christmas. In other words, the deeper into the Advent you go, the closer you get to Christmas Day. For Christians, the First Sunday in Advent is kind of the "New Year's Day" of the Church Year calendar.

Why do we celebrate Advent?

The word Advent means "coming". During Advent we prepare for the coming of One who was born that first Christmas in a stable. We prepare for the One who saved us from sin, death and the power of the devil: our Lord Jesus Christ! What a wonderful and exciting time of preparation.

What is the Advent wreath?

The Advent wreath is the circle of candles that you see in the sanctuary during the season of Advent. There are three purple (or blue) candles, one pink candle and a white candle (also called Christ candle) in the middle.

How do we use the Advent wreath?

Each Sunday in Advent, a new candle on the wreath is lit. During the first week in Advent, only one candle is lit. For example, during the second week in Advent, two candles are lit. We do this to remember and prepare for the coming of our saviour, Jesus Christ, the Light of the world.
