From the Pastor

Last month has been odd. I say this for myself, knowing not everyone may not have the same experience. Primarily, I have in mind what is going on in the Ukraine. When I crack open the latest magazines from within Lutheran Church - Canada, I find articles about the recent efforts in the Ukraine. The Spring issue of Tapestry, the LWMLC magazine, mentions Pastor Oleksiy Navrotskyy, who doubles as LCC's missionary in the Ukraine, regularly traveling to Lviv to lead a women's Bible study. This is definitely not happening now in the Spring. Pastor Navrotskyy is currently in a church basement preaching to people scared for their lives and their nation. Similarly, The Canadian Lutheran magazine, January/February issue, has a couple articles on the Ukraine at the back. One is about concerns about Russia's military build-up. The other article is about the repair of a church roof in a Ukrainian parish. Now that Russia's military is not only built up but spilling into the Ukraine, I can't help wondering if that Ukrainian church needs another roof with all the bombing.

A massive change has occurred in a relatively short period of time—the time between the writing of these articles and their distribution. Given everything going on, even the periodic updates on LCC's website from Ukrainian pastors feel almost out of date as soon as we get them. This world is not stable. If it is not failing in one way, it will be failing in another. And this can happen rather suddenly. (A number of the

people in the congregation with recent health concerns can tell you much the same.)

This gets me thinking back to Ash Wednesday. We had boisterous pancake downstairs then went up to contemplate our own demise in the worship service a moment later. We went from enjoying life together to recognize that this world does not offer life. From dust you are and to dust you shall return. This swift change can be unnerving but the Ash Wednesday service really puts things into perspective. The things of this world are given to destruction. None of this world is meant to live forever because all of this world has been affected by sin. Where there is sin, there is decay unto death. But we look beyond death to a promise that is greater than death. We look forward to the hope of everlasting life in Jesus Christ. Even though your skin may be destroyed, yet in your flesh you will see God face to face.

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die...[God] has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, He has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. (Ecc 3:1-2a, 11)

God has placed the eternality of Christ our Lord into our hearts. Christ lives forever and so do we. When we hear that from dust we are and to dust we shall return, we hear this in the context of knowing that Christ reverses death. In fact, he does more than reverse death. When Christ ushers eternity into our heart through faith, he

undoes the cause of death. Jesus dissolves the sin within the heart. The recreated heart beating in your chest is not bound to sin nor bound to dust but bonded to Christ. Although it may cease to function for a time, you will not be deprived of life for you are never without Jesus.

On Ash Wednesday, we are reminded of Easter. The promise of the resurrection is made so that during the whole of our Lententide, there is no lack of hope for us. Eternity is with us despite this world falling apart. Jesus is the risen Lord who has undone death. This world might offer a time to die like Jesus died at a time 2000 years ago, but through Christ we are also assured a time to be reborn in faith. We are brought out of the deadness of sin unto life everlasting, an eternity promised in our hearts at the present. And we eagerly await the time of the resurrection when eternity will not be only in our hearts but also in our risen flesh.

The world might turn quickly towards evil; now one way, now another. All the while, though, Christ maintains the gift of unwavering salvation that dwells with us. The situation in the Ukraine right now is volatile, frightening, yet still within the Lord's purview. He will continue to offer salvation through His Word the same as He always has. This is message being proclaimed by the pastors in the Ukraine. They preach Christ because in Christ is the hope of the resurrection. Before the war, they preached Christ. Now, during the war, they preach Christ. Our hope does not waver although the world falters.

Music in our worship services is all based on Martin Luther's high regard that music is essential to evangelical worship. He expressed many passionate statements throughout his life that 'next to the Word of God, music is the greatest treasure in the world'. And he set out to compose our greatest hymns of Reformation, to work with many of the greatest musicians of his time for hymn and liturgical composition, he modified and paraphrased Gregorian chants. His accomplishments are vast, and they have endured the test of time to be bound in our hymnals today.

In April, we will journey the final weeks of Lent and then Holy Week. Our hymns and meditative music will reflect the scripture of the service as we sing the poetic words of our faith. On Good Friday, the chimes will play 'Miserere Mei Deus' (G. Allegri), 'Have Mercy on Me, oh God'. This emotional piece was written in the 1600's for Holy Week, scored to be sung by two choirs, and we have adapted this score to our chime choir. The second piece our chime choir will play on Good Friday, is the closing chorale that J.S. Bach wrote for his 'Passion According to St. Matthew'. These are the words:

With Thee, Jesus, will I stay, for Thou are the new Creation;
Thou the Life, the Truth, the Way,
Thou the well-spring of salvation:
Blessed who can say with me: Jesus, I'll ne'er part from Thee

I can think of no other chorale that so embraces our faith in the 'power of the cross', and bridges the sadness of Good Friday with the joy of Easter Sunday.



UKRAINE UPDATE



The United Nations reports more than 3.5 million people have fled since its invasion by Russian forces. An additional 6.6 million people in the country are internally displaced. Reliable counts of civilian deaths are not available at this time, but thousands are believed to have been killed in the conflict so far, with the number expected to continue to rise. It is amazing how God's promise of providing for His people and never abandoning them still continues to be fulfilled today. On Saturday March 26, LWMLC sponsored a webinar to learn and hear directly from our brothers and sisters in Christ about the ways God is blessing and comforting His people. Rev Mark Smith LCC Mission executive, Claire Gerzanova from London, Ontario, a volunteer for LCC missions and Rev Oleskiy Navrotsky, Missionary at large for LCC.

Their heartfelt stories provided an insight to the ongoing mission work and the emergency aid Financial aid is being directed to Lutheran churches in Ukraine as they offer emergency and pastoral care to those still in the Ukraine, as well as support to Lutheran churches in neighboring European nations offering physical and spiritual support to newly arriving refugees. LCC President Timothy Teuscher issued a call for prayer. As the conflict in Ukraine rages on, let us continue to bring this tragic situation before the throne of God in our prayer and especially for the pastors and congregations living in the midst of conflict. God says, "As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you" Isaiah 66:13. We are but His instruments!

death and paid for our sins completely. Now, the first words you hear in church on Easter Sunday are: "The Lord is risen. He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"


