

From the Pastor

Hope Lutheran is kicking off our time back from summer holidays with a Rally Day on Sept 11. There will be fun, food, and fellowship. Honestly, I am a little excited about it myself since this will be my first Rally Day at Hope since I arrived back in the middle of 2020. There were no social gatherings back then. Our church life was limited to coming for worship. There were reduced opportunities for fellowship masked, distanced, and sterilized. Thankfully, some opportunities still existed. Sometimes after services some individually wrapped food was taken outside while we chatted in the sun. Now, nearly two years later, we have more of an opportunity to come together not only in worship but in other aspects of the Christian life. Bible studies, confirmation, coffee hour, and more are coming back into their regular routines, as well as the regular operations of offices in the church like the Parish Planning Council, Board of Properties, and many other positions besides. Rally Day is more than a chance to eat hotdogs and enjoy the weather, it is our opportunity to get to know the people we should be serving in Christ's name.

The temptation is to think we are rallying around our neighbours, or rallying around church positions, or possibly rallying around the leaders of our congregation. We are not because all those things must also be caught up in our rally cry to Christ. We are not here at Hope Lutheran to worship each other, our titles, or our good works. Such was the issue in the early Corinthian congregation. The people were so preoccupied with who they followed within the congregation that they lost sight of whom the congregation was built upon. Paul summarizes this with ironic flair:

What I mean is this: One of you says, "I follow Paul"; another, "I follow Apollos"; another, "I follow Cephas"; still another, "I follow Christ." Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Were you baptized in the name of Paul? (1 Cor 1:12-13)

All the Corinthians were followers of Christ. So, why did they divide themselves according to who they followed or what they did? And how do we do the same? Rather than seeing ourselves as those baptized into Christ and children of the Almighty, sometimes we begrudgingly see ourselves as those who are called for specific tasks in the congregation whatever they happen to be. We are more than our works, our relationships, and our titles. As Christ is undivided so we should be; rallied behind our everlasting Lord.

Our foundation is Christ. He is the rock of salvation on which you stand and the one from whom all graces flow. It is from his sacrifice that we take on blessed callings to fellowship, service, and good works. All these things are wrapped up in the glorious expression of our faith as we recognize the true cause of our rally: the cross of Christ. It may seem odd to have to remind ourselves that we are not eating a hotdog or potato chips as simply those who are hungry. We are eating and drinking because Christ has joined us one to another as his Church to live in him while in this world. Truly, all our actions are defined by the one who defines us by his name, which he placed upon us at baptism. Every little thing you have in this world is a reflection of the love the Lord has for you. Therefore, eat your daily bread for the glory of God! Rally around His name not just on Rally Day but on every day of the everlasting life Christ has placed upon you. But, on Rally Day, remember all that the Lord has given you and to whom you can offer these blessings. Whatever you do, remember that it is the Lord through whom you live and serve.

The Power of Faith, the size of a Mustard Seed



Jesus and his disciples had come back from the

mountain where God had come down in a cloud to tell them that "this is my Son whom I love; with Him I am well pleased. Listen to Him." Matthew 5:5

Following that time, when they came to a crowd, a man asked Jesus to have mercy on him and heal his son, whom the disciples had not healed. Jesus then drove the demon out of the boy after calling the people, "an unbelieving and perverse generation; how long shall I stay with you?". Mat 17:17

In private, Jesus later spoke to his disciples, saying, "Because you have so little faith. (you could not drive out the demon) I tell you the truth, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there and it will move.' "Matt17:20 In context, a mustard seed was the smallest seed that farmers of the day would sow in their garden plots. Yet, the plant would grow to ten feet tall (the largest), a size able to shelter birds. Jesus used parables with the crowds so that they could all understand the lessons, yet he taught the disciples the full meaning of them.

The explanation in the Concordia Bible went on to say that "God's kingdom started with Jesus and twelve disciples and the teachings and faith of the believers grew to be seen by the whole world."

The power of the mustard seed can be compared to the example of hemp seeds that we sprinkle on our cereal. Three tablespoons of those tiny seeds pack a lot of energy. This small amount can provide 10 grams of protein, 12 grams of omega 3 and 6, 20% of healthy fats, 100% of manganese, 48% of magnesium, 22% of iron, 25% of thiamine, 36% phosphorus, as well as other necessary daily nutrients.

This is not necessarily to encourage you to include hemp seeds in your diet, but to give you a visual of the power of a seed, be it food for the body or food for the spirit. The faith given to us by the Holy Spirit grows in us to provide a shelter in which we can find refuge in the love of God, like the birds find safety from the storm or the hawks in the branches of the mustard plant. The seeds of faith preached on the shores of the lake, by Jesus, now circle the globe.

"Nothing will be impossible for you." (*Matt* 17:21)


What does this have to do with the Divine Service?

The Church's calendar determines much of what happens in worship each Sunday (like the colors in the Sanctuary, or the readings for the day). The Church has its own calendar and its own seasons. The Church's seasons are based on the different events in the life of Christ and His Church. Instead of Summer, Fall, Winter and Spring, the Church's calendar has Advent, Christmas, Lent and many more. This calendar helps put order to the seasons and festivals of the Church.

Parents: Before or after the service, direct your children to the front of the hymnal to find the liturgical calendar. Go through the calendar and discuss the different seasons. Remind them that

many of the special dates we have on our everyday calendars come from the liturgical calendar, i.e. Christmas, Easter, etc.
