#### From the Pastor

Grace and blessing to you,

Unusually, All Saints Day, the Last Sunday of the Church Year, and the beginning of Advent are all packed close this November. Since All Saints (Nov 1) occurs early in the week (Tues.), our observation of this holy day is transferred to the first Sunday in November. This means that all three occasions are being celebrated in almost back-to-back Sundays (Nov 6, 20, and 27). I find this intriguing considering how the themes of these days all build each other up.

All Saints Day has its origins in the 4th century as one of the earliest holy days celebrated on the Christian calendar. (As a reference, Christmas Day was first recognized in the 2<sup>nd</sup> century but the first recorded Christmas service was in 336, that is, the 4th century. Celebrations of All Saints and Christmas began being celebrated roughly near the same time.) As the name suggests, we remember all the saints on this day. Our main interest is not the saints who are among the Church Militant-the part of the body of believers who fight the good fight of faith on earth. All Saints Day tends to focus on the Church Triumphant—the growing portion of the body of believers who rest from their earthly labours and await the coming resurrection. This holy day is celebrating that fact that although the Church is divided with a veil of tears, we are never truly separated from those who have gone before us in the faith because Christ unites

us all in his body. The sacrament of holy communion is particularly poignant by promising that when we partake of Christ's body and blood for our salvation, this salvation is being enjoyed by the saints in heaven who are in the body of Christ. We give thanks to the Lord on All Saints not only for the lives of those He has given to build up the Church but also for the fact we are all united in Christ, looking forward to being united in paradise.

The Last Sunday of the Church Year marks the final Sunday before Advent. The focus of this occasion is the Last Day, which means we are looking forward to when this world of sin and death is finally destroyed and the new heavens and the new earth are forged by God for our eternal blessing. While the "end of the world" theme is usually depicted negatively in the world, the scriptures always view it as something positive. It is when our Lord returns bodily among us that we may dwell with him forever and receive the fulfilment of every last promise he has made. One of these promises is the union with all those who have gone before us in the faith—all those we remember on All Saints Day. In the resurrection, we will all share in Christ's glorious resurrection on Easter and never be separated from those among his body.

Advent has two dimensions to it. Most people think of the theme of Christ's first coming in the manger since we are looking forward to Christmas. However, the underlying theme of Advent is Christ's second coming with power from the cloud of God's glory to judge the living and the dead. This is why the options for the gospel reading of the first Sunday in Advent are (1) the Triumphal Entry when Christ comes as king to lead his people and (2) Christ's prophecy of him appearing on the Last Day. We remember with joy his first coming and his winning of salvation then blend that with the joy of his second coming where he will put death under his feet and raise us from the grave (1 Cor 15:23-28).

So then, what are we doing this month? We are looking forward to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, remembering that those who have died in him are not truly dead but alive and awaiting the resurrection on the Last Day. In truth, this should be a thought proclaimed throughout the Church year (which I try to do) but the overlapping of nuanced ideas here makes things all the more interesting. As we look forward this coming month to all the holy days-major and minor-let us celebrate that fact that, despite the loneliness and pain observing important occasions without those we have lost to death, Christ has triumphed over death and brings into one body of believers that death itself cannot destroy.

#### A Home for our Fall Closet Cleanup

Speaking of sharing with our neighbours, this letter was received from Erin Rylek, Coordinator I Volunteer Resources Auxiliary to BC Children's Hospital

I am happy to report that to date this Fiscal year (April 2022 - March 2023) inclusive of September the Hope Evangelical Lutheran Church has raised \$513.80 for the Auxiliary to BC Children's Hospital. With six months to go, I estimate you will exceed the amount raised last year. The Auxiliary is very appreciative of the relationship we have built over the past four years and all the funds that have been raised by Hope Evangelical Lutheran Church.

The Auxiliary to BCCH holds a strong partnership with the Salvation Army for this social enterprise. Salvation Army pays the Auxiliary to BCCH per pound of clothing that is collected. Salvation Army takes the items from the bins and distributes to their local thrift shops, hamper programs and shelters. The clothing that cannot be worn is sent to rag houses to be recycled into cloths that are used by painting companies and auto shops. The clothing donation bins help to deviate a significant amount of textiles from the landfill each year. Overall this program is a win - win for all involved.

#### Children's Corner

Do Lutherans honor and remember the saints?

Yes. Remembering and honoring the saints is very "Lutheran." God's Word and the Lutheran Confessions teach that remembering honoring the saints is a great thing to do.



## Why is it such a great thing to do?

The Apology of the Augsburg Confession, which explains what Lutherans believe, teaches that we honor the saints for three reasons.

Thanksgiving. When we honor the saints, we thank God for "showing (his people) examples of his mercy, revealing his will to save men, and giving teachers and other gifts to the church." Strengthening our faith. When we see how our Lord forgives the saints, we are "encouraged to believe that grace does abound more than sin." (Do you remember when Peter, one of the disciples, denied Jesus three times? Even the Apostles sinned and received forgiveness.) (3) "the imitation, first of their faith and then of their other virtues ..." We pray that God would keep us as strong in the faith as they were!

Parents: Explain to your children that we are not praying to the saints; we are simply honoring them on a special day in the Church Year. Remind them that, when we die, we will be with our Lord in heaven, which is where the saints are right now!
