From the Pastor

Usually, my Newsletter articles are a devotional talk to the people in (and outside of) the congregation. In light of the Congregation Meeting coming up on Feb 19 for planning, for this article I thought it would be good to speak to (1) what we decided in the past year, (2) what we did based on those decisions, and (3) where we are now. This will assist in letting the whole congregation know what is going on, since there may be things of which members are unaware since not everyone attends the quarterly meetings.

(1) What did the congregation decide regarding ministry? The question of our ministry was up in the air somewhat during the vacancy and pandemic.

All Christians have the broad directive to make disciples of all nations by baptizing and teaching them (Matt 28:18-20). Christ has delivered us from sin, death, and the power of the devil. He has brought us into salvation. Now we wish for others to join us in this good and gracious gift offered through the message of the Gospel.

The purpose of the Congregation Meeting on 27 Feb 2022 was to direct us in mission when the pandemic and its restrictions were mostly alleviated; we wanted to get back into the swing of things. The issue, though, was that Hope Lutheran Church has changed over the past few decades. We are a small congregation now; our attendance is typically under thirty on Sundays. The pool of people with available time, treasures, and talents is

shrinking. If we broaden our mission too much, we may not have the resources to effectively carry out all our missional goals as a congregation, which means we need to be more targeted in our approach.

When establishing a goal, we must be mindful of our starting point so we can make it realistic. After a lot of discussion at the Feb 2022 meeting, we reached a decision for our immediate goal: Make Hope Lutheran Church our mission. We decided to work to strengthen our own congregation in order to work on longer term goals in the future (outreach, evangelism, and missions). This mission acknowledges our starting point of fewer members and lower income as a congregation. Next up would be formulating measurable steps towards meeting our goal. This was set as the focus of our next meeting on 15 May 2022, which would also feature the election of members to the Parish Planning Council.

The May 2022 meeting revealed some significant issues that our congregation was facing, resulting from the stresses experienced over the past few years. One of them was readily evident when less than half the available leadership positions in the church were filled. In fact, if one person had not decided to let their name stand for the Council shortly before this meeting, we would not have enough people to still count as a charity under the BC Societies Act. That would mean we would lose our tax exemption status, among other things.

The major reason for empty positions at Hope is burnout. Many members have felt the strain of the great effort required to maintain our church. This was definitely an issue before the pandemic with the pandemic only making it worse. Also, the fact that it really surprised congregants we had fewer people willing to serve revealed another major issue in our congregation: A breakdown in communication between the governing positions and the general body of the congregation.

The prolonged discussion at the May 2022 meeting determined a number of actions we could take to help Hope Lutheran Church. These include improving leadership and coordination between leadership and the congregation; improving communication; having an available list of tasks for people in the congregation to perform; putting out a request to the congregation to reflect on personal gifts, abilities, and resources they could offer to further Hope Lutheran's mission; offer new topics or styles of Bible studies; and hold more congregational events for our fellowship.

(2) What did we do? In general, we improved coordination and leadership as well as compiled or refreshed lists of Roles and Responsibilities for the various positions of service at the church.

the Given current size of congregation, there is no way that we can fulfill everything listed in our bylaws. The Roles and Responsibilities lists are meant to simplify the listed tasks, especially for our smaller groups. There are different versions of the descriptions of the roles, from general (pamphlets) to moderate amounts of description (handouts) to more comprehensive information (detailed descriptions upon request). The information is available but there has yet to be any expressed interest from within the congregation, aside from those already in positions, by anyone willing to take on leadership roles in the church. Therefore, most positions on the PPC and boards are still vacant.

And then comes mentorship. It was suggested for younger members of our church

to have churchly mentors. While we do not have any formal system in place, after participating in a joint Altar Guild and Confirmation study on our worship space in the sanctuary, the confirmands may be called upon by the Altar Guild and other congregants serving in worship to assist with worship services in various capacities.

Improving congregational communication—another of our objectives—has been difficult since notice boards, monthly newsletters, weekly emails, our website, Facebook page, YouTube channel, etc. were already functioning and being regularly updated with new information. The only thing that we could change is having more face-to-face (or phone-to-phone) conversations about matters directly involving people in the congregation.

Along with the Roles and Responsibilities lists for different leadership positions previously mentioned, various lists of tasks that could be done at the church were compiled and included regular activities or help with one-off events. These lists were provided in the "Stewards in All Seasons" pamphlets printed in Sept 2022 (still available in the narthex and upon request). They have appeared elsewhere as well. A more targeted task list, for example, is the sign-up sheet for after-service coffee and fellowship, which is pinned to a notice board in the narthex to which several people have leant their names.

Congregational reflection on personal gifts, abilities, and resources has also been presented, and as a result some new people stepped forward to offer their efforts toward certain tasks around the church. Some of these tasks were one-offs and others were of limited duration.

Regarding Bible studies, a questionnaire was sent out twice asking congregants to suggest times and subjects of study but there were only a few returned. Therefore, weekly

Tuesday and Sunday studies and the monthly LWMLC study resumed per usual. Something new was a book discussion launched in Langford, currently reading through "The Hammer of God" by Bo Giertz. All four groups are usually small with a couple of new people often attending aside from our regulars.

And then we have congregational events. We had Rally Day on the second Sunday in September for the first time in years and our first Oktoberfest luncheon on Reformation Sunday. Both had good attendance (almost everyone in worship on Reformation Sunday came to the luncheon) but only a few of our relatively inactive members attended. The second annual tree decoration (complete with movie and treats afterward) also had a number of people come out, mostly the younger families. While we also considered worship events, like hymn-sing services, none have taken place so far.

(3) So where do we go from here? This is for the congregation to decide and will be discussed at the upcoming Congregation Meeting on 19 Feb 2023.

Until then, I can offer a number of considerations.

Our current goal:

- Strengthening Hope Lutheran Church is our mission
- We should focus on strengthening our congregation for
 - o Outreach
 - o Evangelism
 - o Missions

Where we are now:

- Slight improvements to congregational participation in worship, devotion, fellowship, and stewardship
- No new personnel in church leadership with many positions vacant
- Few new members attending
- Some faithful members have passed away this past year

 Our projected budget for 2023 has a deficit of \$33 586.75

Questions to consider:

- What would encourage people in the congregation to participate more?
- How do we reach people in our families who are not coming?
- What can we do to spread the Gospel
 - o among family and friends?
 - o in the neighbourhood?
 - o in the city?
- Do you feel reluctant to share your faith and what would help encourage you?
- What events at the church (e.g., talks, open question nights, open house, etc.) do you think might bring people in the door at least once?
- What should we do to address the budget?

May we all consider our roles and responsibilities to our congregation in faith. The Lord Jesus Christ bless and preserve us according to His good and gracious will that we may continue to live in and proclaim the Gospel all the days of our life. Amen.

Thanks for all your donations to the clothing bin.



Special thanks to Mario and Barbara for the Lenten soups for each Wednesday. Please speak to Barbara if you are able to help with setup or cleanup.



Why do we do this?


