

From the Pastor

Grace and blessing to you,

With Christmas occurring on a Sunday this year, Advent started early on Nov 27. This means our holiday busyness is starting earlier than it usually does, not even waiting until December. Per usual, the secular world is celebrating early too with massive Christmas displays and present-pushing as of mid-November. In your personal life, you might already be preparing baked goods, presents, travel plans, etc. Hope Lutheran is not far behind with our religious celebrations of Christ coming in the flesh – which marks the true spirit of this time of year – and we are busy too. There are Sunday Advent services, midweek services on Wednesday evenings with a soup and bun supper, the Christmas tree decoration on Dec 10, and the usual Bible studies and confirmation classes going on until Dec 20. And we brush against the common temptation of succumbing to the busyness of the season without paying homage to the cause of celebration.

The origin of Christmas is Christ. Christ is the child of promise born of a virgin in Bethlehem. He came into this world that he might take upon our flesh, offer up that crucified flesh for the forgiveness of sins, and raise that flesh from death for our deliverance. All our celebration revolves around this; Christ came into this world to bring us into the salvation of the Lord. Truly, it is a joy knowing that we need not die in our sins but find life and light in Jesus, the babe born in Bethlehem. The spirit of the Christmas season is captivated by the precious gift God has given to us in the manger. This greatest gift of all should inspire all our giving and goodwill at this time of year—and all year round.

Yet, the perennial message we find at Christmas is not "look to the Christ child" but "prepare". Advent is a season of preparation but the reason for our preparation is not busyness for the sake of being busy. Our thoughts, actions, and prayers should always be centred on Christ for it is he who gives us the joy to celebrate the season. He has come that we might live eternally. He is present in the manger that we may gaze upon our Saviour. He is the Light of the World that outshines the Star of Bethlehem, making God's glory manifest around us.

Sadly, the secular message we hear is "be busy". We are to do more, talk more, and consume more. Even the parts of Advent meant to proclaim Christ sometimes feel like they are a bit much; should we participate in all of them all the services and studies? But what is the true message of the season? The coming of Christ for our salvation. When things seem too busy and hectic, meditate on this. Think of how Christ has come that you may have life in his name and find peace in paradise. For this reason, do not frame the activities of the holiday as things you have to do but things you get to do on account of Christ.

The presents you give are not about making sure you appease whoever receives it. Your presents are the outworking of the joy you have because you have already received the gift of Christ. You are not scheduling family gatherings because you have to but because you can share the love which Christ has worked within you. You come to worship in church not because you must but because the Lord has made available times for you to dwell on the promises in Christ and receive His love and forgiveness through Word and Sacrament. Church should not be an obligation but a privilege where you come before God with other believers to receive His grace in Christ and thank Him for this most precious gift. Let us encourage one another in Christ not to be busy but to celebrate Christ in all that we do.

Joy! What brings you joy? How do you give joy to others? Are these joyful moments

only when something extraordinary happens or do you find joy in everyday moments? How do you share joy? How do you give thanks for joy?

At the November "Hammer of God" monthly book study with Pastor, we discussed prayer and the types of prayer. One form of prayer is for giving thanks. As all things come from God, prayers of thanksgiving—including for joy are pleasing to God. There are differences between happiness and joy as well as degrees and types of joy and ways that they are experienced by each person.

Beethoven dedicated a musical ode, recognized around the world, to joy. A whole host of angels proclaimed " joy" to shepherds in the field. Joy is an element in our lives that promotes longevity and better memory retention. We don't have to look far to see the proof of that even in our own congregation.

Earlier I asked what are some ways that you share joy with others. When we share the means of joy through donations of funds, goods, or services, we don't always see how the recipient expresses their joy; we can only imagine it and be pleased.

As for kinds of joy, there are numerous ones. As I write this, I am watching the performance of an orchestra playing music by Handel. "Pure majesty" is all that I can say! Joy can be felt when a tiny finger grasps yours or an age-worn hand gives your arm a gentle, loving pat.

The angels that night near Bethlehem could not contain their joy and sang it out from the heavens to shepherds! They knew that Jesus Christ was coming to earth to save us, to forgive all our sins, to teach us about our Father in heaven and knew that he would ascend again to intercede our prayers and be with us always! What joy!

Each day, recognize joy in your lives, be it the brilliant colours of leaves or soft shades of glowing sunsets, the meals that we prepare, the blessings of family and friends, or the Bible scriptures that give us reassurance that we are loved by Jesus Christ.

Then give thanks, "with a grateful heart", knowing that we have the blessings of earthly joy and the promise of joyful, everlasting life, through Christ, our Lord and Saviour.

God bless you and keep you and give you peace that passes all understanding and keep all of our hearts and minds in Jesus Christ.

May the Advent and Christmas seasons bring you and your family joy throughout the coming new year! Amen
