### From the Pastor

God's blessings to you,

This past month has been a little tremulous for Hope Lutheran Church. While the congregation was contemplating what to do concerning a projected deficit budget, I received a call from another congregation. It was not until Feb 19 that I could announce my decision to decline the call (please pray for St Peter's Lutheran Church in Estevan) and we could have a Congregational Meeting regarding the budget. The discussion in the meeting has left me hopeful that we, as a congregation, will address our difficulties in a godly and rational manner in order to move forward. And with the changing of the Church season, we are invited to reflect on these things all the more.

On Ash Wednesday (Feb 22), we entered the season of Lent. It is a time of penance, prayer, and fasting to redirect our focus toward God's importance in our lives. When you give up particular foods, you are consciously making an effort to decline what you normally would do and say that God is richer than the foods you have forsaken. When you give up certain activities, you possess more time for prayer and meditation on God's word. So, as we move forward as a congregation, let us use this time to pray and meditate on how to serve God and one another at Hope Lutheran Church, enlivened by Christ.

There are two sides of what we have to consider for Hope Lutheran's future. On the right hand

is the proclamation of the Gospel, and on the left is the practical workings of everyone according to God's governing Law. (This is in the motif of the Lutheran teaching of Two Kingdoms Theology, which I used to outline things at the Congregational Meeting.) As the Church of our Lord, we are of the right-hand kingdom. We have been called to preach the Gospel, spreading the good news that salvation is found in Christ. This we do in Word and Sacrament every worship service, and also in everyday activities amongst our neighbours when we point to Christ. Without the Gospel, we cannot be the Church. It is what defines us. Yet, we cannot live without the Law either. We are the Church founded on the Gospel, but our congregation is in the world where the laws of nature, principles of economics, and legislation of Canada apply. Our building is subject to decay and the various things we do cost money. That is simply reality. Therefore, if we wish to continue preaching Christ crucified in our building, we must consider the cost.

In the parable of the Dishonest Manager (Luke 16:19), Jesus speaks of a man who is about to be fired by his master. Seeking to garner good relations with people before he is unemployed and homeless, the manager reduces the debts owed to his master. The master then commends the manager for his shrewdness in cultivating friendships. "For sons of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than the sons of light." There are times we should be thinking of finances and property if this means we can continue delivering the grace

which comes from the Gospel. These worldly things should never outshine the Gospel but we should still count the cost.

The suggestion given in the Congregational Meeting (and currently being researched for its viability and presentation at the next meeting on June 11) is to sell off part of our parking lot to developers and also pave over the grass to supplement this reduced parking. In terms of God's left-hand kingdom of the Law, this could be a good financial decision to help us continue preaching the Gospel. However, we still need long term planning in order to communicate the Gospel. This means we need people outside the congregation to receive the Gospel.

We should be thinking of ways to invite people into the building to join us in faith and fellowship. It is rare for people (not on vacation) to stumble upon us without an invitation. Therefore, whom can we invite? And to what can we invite them? Thinking forward, Easter breakfast would be a good event to invite people to join us so that we might establish a relationship before the worship service. It has also been suggested we go back to having family events—lunch and games—once a month. How can we, as sons of light, be shrewd in dealing with our neighbours, the sons of this world, that they may witness the light of Christ and join us in his Church?

"By Grace, we are saved", A Response to God's Grace

What is our reaction to this amazing gift from God? Thanks is not enough; nor is a show of gratitude. Our imperfection cannot adequately begin to repay the grace received from God.

And, how can we give back to God what He has already given us? Giving God a gift is like giving a gift to someone who has "everything".

On the other hand, upon receiving a gift there is a requirement for a thank you, an acknowledgement of another's generosity. "Give thanks with a grateful heart" is the first line of one of our hymns. Still, thankfulness is only the beginning!

Jesus instructs us in how to respond to the gift of grace, by giving us the new commandment, "Love one another as I have loved you."

Then He does more! He teaches us, through the Word written down by His disciples, to do "as Christ would do" with word and action. Jesus (among other miracles) fed the hungry, cured the sick, consoled the mourners, and healed people who had fallen away from their faith. None of us can do all that is needed, as He did. We can work together to do some by combining our mites, resources, and time, to work with what God gives us. We can open our eyes to needs in the community, locally or globally, to share what we are able, in a joint effort.

Go out two by two, Jesus teaches us, to listen and talk with people, who need aid or compassion and do it in the name of the Lord.

In the season of Lent, meditation and worship is focused on God's grace and Christ's sacrifice and how we are saved through it. Take time to contemplate and pray about what we can do for others and then, as importantly, follow through with actions to show His grace, with the help of God. There is much to be done.

In Luke 10:1-2, Jesus sends out seventy-two more people into the field, two by two, to prepare the villages for His arrival. "He told them, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the workers

are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field.' "(Matthew 9:37-38)

Show God's grace to us by our words and actions with others; in His name, we pray.

On Feb 26th, we began our Lent worship services. The opening meditation piece, "Pie Jesu", was sung by Belle Voci. The words of "Pie Jesu" translate to 'Lord, may they rest in peace' and is often sung at funerals. It is also appropriate for Lent, connecting death with peace, and the strength of our faith for resurrection.

In a few weeks, the chime choir will play a different version of the "Pie Jesu", from Gabriel Fauré's most eloquent Requiem.

Another of our Lenten meditation pieces will be "Lamb of God" from my Ancient Hymns music book, with this score composed by Giovanni Palestrina, one of the leading composers of the 16th century.

We are using Divine Setting 3 during Lent, known to some and not so familiar to others. It is one of the older liturgical settings with a more pensive tone. I am sure that this is why Pastor selected this setting for Lent. Whether or not the musical setting is familiar to you to sing, try to embrace the pensive mood of Setting 3 and it will add to your Lenten worship and prayers.

## Back to the Future

January 27, 2023, marked the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the dedication of our current church building!

During the 1950s, Hope Lutheran's congregation was outgrowing the previous church (located on the corner of Princess Ave and Chambers St.). In April of 1959, plans to relocate it officially began. Not long after that in September 1959-the lots on Dean and Carrick Streets were selected and purchased. On April 1, 1962, the ground was ceremoniously broken and the following Wednesday the basement was dug. Less than three months later, on June 24, 1962, the Cornerstone was laid. And finally, on January 27, 1963, with Rev. L.M. Carlson serving as pastor, the new Hope Lutheran Church was dedicated.

To commemorate this joyful and significant event, a dedication booklet was created and published. This booklet is a 14-page memento that includes a message from Pastor Carlson, a brief history of the church (which was only 18 years old at the time!), a summary of the planning and building of the new church, and a list of gifts and memorials made in honour of the dedication.

To the right is a page from that booklet, chosen to remind us of what we as a church committed to with the new building, both in body and soul.

May God help us to be inspired and motivated by this dedication now, 60 years later.

May each heart be reverent and devout in adoration of the Saviour.


May every vow before His altar be kept by the power of His Holy Spirit.







THE OLD CHURCH CORNER, PRINCESS AND CHAMBERS

# Children's Corner and for those Young at Heart

Hey! What happened to the "a" word?

There's one word we often use in the Church that isn't used during Lent. Usually we use it after responsories, antiphons and other



parts of our worship. Have you guessed what the word is yet? If you guessed "alleluia," then you are right. We stop singing and saying "alleluia" during Lent and won't speak it again until Easter morning.

What does "alleluia" mean and why don't we say it during Lent?

"Alleluia" is a Hebrew word that means "Praise the Lord." Since we focus on the sufferings and death of Jesus during Lent, we stop using this joyful word until we celebrate Jesus' glorious resurrection. On Easter morning the first words you hear will be: "The Lord is risen. He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

#### Parents:




During worship, help your children to look for places in the service where "alleluia" has been omitted. Notice the red writing in the hymnal. These words will help to point out when and where we might use or refrain from using the "a" word.


#### Lent and Easter Crossword
