### From the Pastor

Where is our Lord on Easter? The answer is obvious: not the tomb. On Easter Sunday, the tomb of Jesus Christ is empty for our Lord has stepped out of death into life by stepping out of the tomb into the garden surrounding it. Yet, Jesus does not remain in the vicinity of the tomb for the whole day. Jesus moves around.

First, He is away from the tomb so the women, Peter, and John arrive to find nothing left but the linen that once wrapped our Lord's body. Then Jesus is back at the tomb to console a weeping Mary Magdalene. For part of the day, He accompanies two disciples on the road to Emmaus to break bread with them at the onset of evening. And lastly, Christ appears in the locked room in the evening to give the disciples the Holy Spirit. This is a pretty full day.

Thinking about ourselves, though, we are not only concerned with where Jesus was on the first Easter but where He is in our own Easter celebrations. Rather than searching chocolate eggs, which have nothing to do with the Bible (despite being rather delicious), we should be searching for our Lord because our need for Him is always great. There are the sins that weigh heavily on our conscience. There are the evils which attack body and spirit. And most recently, there is the concerning news of of the lack finances threatening congregation. (This subject garnered much attention during our last Congregation Meeting.) Thankfully, we were able to discuss some possible options for approaching this

issue; but if we were to pursue any one of them without Christ, then we would be working in vain.

Some Christians may point to Christ being at the right hand of the Father in heaven, since that is where Christ ascended to be, but we know that our Lord extends Himself beyond that locale. We find Jesus is exactly where He promises to be: among His people in the Church through Word and Sacrament. The Lord declared that wherever two or more are gathered in His name, there He will be among them (Matt 18:20). Therefore, when Christ is present in discussion and worship, He is there alongside us. Likewise, Christ declares the bread of holy communion is His body and the cup is His blood shed for the forgiveness of sins (Matt 26:26-28). So, here He is again for those who are gathered to receive Him.

Like the first Easter, Jesus sojourns with and dwells among His people. Jesus is the One who actively seeks us out to be with us. He appeared to Mary Magdalene and the disciples when they were in despair over their deceased Lord. And Jesus gave Mary and the disciples the Word of the Gospel that He lives and reigns eternally, that all those who believe in Him have everlasting life. For us at Hope Lutheran, Jesus seeks us out through His people and through His word spoken by them. Whatever troubles we may face in our future, the Lord is present with us and will guide us through them.

# RightNow Media Resources

During the last Congregation Meeting on Feb. 19, a point of new business was brought forward. Hope Lutheran had been contacted by a company called RightNow Media, which has an online database of Christian materials for personal and group study. The congregation voted in favour of paying for a one-year subscription to this service for the purpose of using it in evangelism. We can give access to these materials to people in our congregation (or outside it) who are currently not in active worship or study at the church. Also, if we rely on some of these materials for Bible studies, I (Pastor Chandler) can spend a couple of hours a week (normally dedicated to Bible study prep) toward other projects like evangelism in our community.
