#### From the Pastor

Later this month, on May 11, Lutherans from the mainland and I will be taking part in the March for Life in Victoria. Hopefully you will be able to come as well. But even if you cannot take part in the March, you can still join us at Hope Lutheran Church for a worship service and lunch before the March. With this in mind, I thought it might be good to explore why life has such importance for us as Christians.

It might seem odd (even counterintuitive) to try to justify why life might be important to a person. If you were not alive already, you could not contemplate how life is important. Life and reflection on life's importance go hand in hand. But more generally: if you consider anything valuable and worthy of experiencing or considering, then you desire life to some extent in order to experience or consider this important thing. Yet, throughout time, there have been people who have proposed that life is not worth living—either for themselves or for other people.

The majority of the (secular) public debate today advocates that life is not worth living for other people, not necessarily themselves. This is evident more from the abortion debate. The unborn fetuses cannot voice their own opinions, so pro-choice advocates speak for them by declaring that these unborn babies should not be alive. The unborn are denied a choice at all in favour of the comfort of the mother. Ironically, the main line of defense for mercy killing,

euthanasia, assisted suicide, or medical assistance in dying (all different terms for basically the same thing) is that a person should be allowed a choice in saying they should die. This is also problematic considering that most—if not all—people who would be voicing that they want to die are under duress—significant pain on the physical and/or emotional levels are causing them to act against better judgment.

But how would Christians argue for life? So far, I have only been presenting some of the issues in the philosophical debate, not the theological debate. The philosophical debate is more concerned with attaching value to human life. If you have a valuable quality (such as health, wealth, happiness, or rationality), then your life is worth living. Without this or that valuable aspect of life, life for you is deemed not worth living. This is of course insulting to anyone clinging to life without meeting all of society's standards for what constitutes the good life.

The Christian argument works very differently. We are actually arguing that your life is not worth anything. In fact, your life is forfeit because it is tainted with sin and not worthy in and of itself to be saved. The worth of human life comes not from within us but outside of ourselves. Our Lord and God, Jesus Christ, came into this world to deliver us from sin and death. The greatest love this world has ever known was displayed at the cross where our God, in His humility, shed His blood for us that we might live with Him eternally. Christ places

worth on us by offering his life to each person through faith. Therefore, every human life—whether in the womb, in the prime of life, or in a sickbed—should be as valuable to us as the life of our Lord who died for them.

The Christian defense of life is a defense of the greatness and love of God. What if a human life is lacking in what the secular world considers valuable? Unborn babies lack rationality. Patients with chronic illnesses lack health. suffering from depression People happiness. But so what? Christ has died for them all that they may join him in righteousness and blessedness forevermore. The victory of his cross has undone sin and opened the way to paradise with resurrected flesh. The pains of body and soul found in this world will not be found in the next. Christ has not died so these people would die but that they may have new life-beginning in this world and extending to the world to come. And while they, like all of us, are not deserving of life on account of sin, Christ gives them life through faith that they may always live with him.

We love our neighbours because Christ has loved them through his cross. We should not count the life of our Lord so cheaply by throwing away someone for whom he has died. And we show this valuing of our Lord not only in championing protection of life. We also help our neighbours in their broken flesh, broken minds, and broken spirits in this world. For in this world or the next, all those who live in faith will have their bodies, minds, and spirits restored in fullness of life.

Jesus' New Testament commandment is, "To love one another as we are first loved."


