From the Pastor

Over the last few months, Hope Lutheran Church has been trying to reach her members and have serious discussion on our future as a congregation. This conversation has taken place in congregation meetings, summer discussion sessions, emails, newsletters, and more. Since some of this is online or just absorbed through word-of-mouth, it is difficult to gauge how many people of the congregation are aware of all that has been discussed. The turnout at the in-person events suggests that at least half of the congregation is grappling with our future and the current problems we face. These problems include the smaller and aging population of the congregation which has culminated in a significant deficit in our budget.

Those not yet attending the in-person discussions will probably be unaware of what is being discussed (but some notes have been compiled and will be available soon). Most of the print materials given to the congregation focus on the pending financial problem—our immediate need—so it might surprise people that a lot of discussion in our sessions has been about evangelism. A congregation engaged in mission to the community is a healthy congregation and will, over time, gather more people into God's Church. Finances are the immediate concern but a healthy congregation, over time, will correct financial issues.

With this in mind, I'll talk about a few things to

keep in mind about evangelism in the present day.

The if-you-build-it-they-will-come model of evangelism has not worked since the '90s. This model proposes that, by founded/constructed congregation/church, people will gradually fill it up. This worked well in North America, especially post-WWII, because of immigration from Europe and the profound need for Christ's peace following the war. However, the trend in the past thirty years or so has been people steadily leaving the Church. We have many churches built already but people are not coming. So, is there a point in "building" new programs and events? Absolutely, but the goal isn't to inundate people with events.

Building events won't make people come, but building relationships will. The statistics from the past couple of decades inform us that the majority of people are most likely to worship with us if there is a personal connection they have in the church or are supported by Christian connections. You yourself can likely point to friends, family, or strong role models who compelled you to be engaged in the faith. Therefore, we should keep doing events and programs at our church with the understanding that we need to be welcoming everyone in the name of Christ and sharing his love with them. The goal of our evangelism effort is to help people have a relationship (living faith) with Christ. Our relationships in Christlike love help others establish their own relationship to the love of Christ. This of course means we preach Christ when people come and care about their personal needs.

Usually, converts to Lutheranism in North America come from other Christian denominations and not straight from unbelief. Even though Lutherans have not been as assertive in evangelism in our communities, our beliefs appeal to people who seek to deepen their faith and engage with historical doctrine. Lutheranism has deep roots in tradition, offers a sense of meaning and reverence, promotes strong morals, and proclaims the Gospel clearly over the condemnation of the Law. This is attractive to sinners seeking redemption and a connection to Christians not just in the present but also the past. (An issue we face is that many people seeking this stuff don't realize Lutherans exist or don't know what we believe so they bypass us as they enter Roman Catholicism or Eastern Orthodoxy.)

Lastly, developing faith takes time. It often takes years (the average I heard is four, but C.S. Lewis took about 15 years) between when a person begins to be challenged by matters of faith and when they fully engaged as Christians in God's Church. When you talk to someone, it is difficult to know what stage he or she may be in with his or her journey to Christ. You might be planting the seed, watering it, or trimming the full-grown branches. In any case, we should proclaim the Gospel at all times so that we might help people no matter where they are in the faith. But this also means, while evangelism is necessary, it will not immediately bring people into our building who are ready to start tithing. That's fine. Faith is not about finances and teaching about stewardship takes time. So we need to keep in mind that evangelism does not guarantee an immediate solution to our current financial problem, nor can confidently say that it will be rectified several

years from now. Therefore, we need to consider how we can mitigate our financial problems in the near future so we can focus on our true task as a congregation: preaching Christ.

May the Lord guide us in our thoughts, words, and actions to spread the good news of salvation here in Victoria and lead us forward in continuing doing so in the future.

We are asked to put God first, to pray to Him to lead us on the path of righteousness, to forgive and love others as He first forgives and loves us. He gives us everything that we need to keep our hearts and minds in Christ.

We are also asked to pray for each other. In Hebrews 13:18, the writer, a follower of Christ, says, "Pray for us. We are sure that we have a in every way." He then prays, "May the God of peace, who through the blood of the eternal covenant brought back from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, equip you with everything good for doing His will, and may work in us what is pleasing to Him through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen". v. 20-21

IMPACT Youth Gathering



Children's Corner and for those Young at Heart

What are "vestments"?

When you first see the pastor and his assistants in the Divine Service, what do you notice about them? They are wearing long robes and other unique garments. These are called "vestments." The word "vestment" comes from the Latin word vestimentum




which means "garment of office." Vestments are garments worn by the pastor and the assistants during the Divine Service and other prayer offices..

Why are vestments used?

A person's vestment tells us about who they are and their role during the Divine Service. If you have two or more pastors, one may be dressed in vestments that mark him as the presiding minister. The other pastors may be dressed in vestments that mark them as assisting ministers. Vestments help to keep the proclamation of the Gospel and administration of the Sacraments in good order. Did you know that God's people have been using vestments since Old Testament times? Wow! Vestments are great tools in the church!

Parents: Before the Divine Service, direct your child's attention to the pastor's vestments. What color are they? How are they different from what you are wearing? Be sure to let your child approach the pastor after church to ask him questions about the vestments.
