# From the Pastor

Even though the liturgical year of the Church begins with Advent, our congregation still has a celebration of beginnings in September. In our recent history, this has been marked by Rally Day (on Sept 10 this year) but the usual pattern is that there are some "stops" in the congregation at the beginning of summer with a number of "starts" at the end of summer. Most of us are regulated by summer vacations and school calendars which means an end to things like Bible studies for the summer. The members of our congregation, though not of the world, are still operating within the world.

The most notable things to mark our calendars will be an influx of Bible studies and choir practice hours. The first full week of September at Hope Lutheran Church will feature regular practices of the Belle Voci choir and the chimers, alongside the Tuesday (Gospel of John) Sunday (Evangelism and Apologetics) Bible studies. Confirmation class will be up and running soon as well. Our monthly studies will begin with "Lunch and Learn" on the fourth Thursday of the month and the book discussion group (time to be determined). Hopefully, we'll also be able to start up things in the next couple months with a lectionary seminar (one-time event for lectors and anyone interested in public speaking), a widow(er)s/grief support group, and maybe a men's morning study. (These three things have been proposed in the past but have not yet been implemented.) Also of interest is possible

ministry to Amica Jubilee House, a new senior living residence a few blocks from our church. I was contacted recently by Amica to see if I and other people in our congregation may want to participate in leading a monthly chapel service starting in November.

And alongside all these new things is the continuation of old concerns like our discussions on how to continue financially as a congregation. This has been the ongoing conversation over the summer with three dedicated discussion sessions. It has been, unfortunately, hanging over our heads for awhile and we hope to make a decision about how to proceed at our Congregation Meeting on Sept 17. We want to make a new start on how to approach things.

But despite our desires and needs to begin anew this September, we already find that we are living in newness. If anyone is in Christ, that person is a new creation for the old has passed away and the new has come (2 Cor 5:18). We are not the same as we were before Christ came into our lives and transformed us to become pleasing unto our God. We are not the sinners we were before but consecrated saints that are welcomed into our heavenly Father's presence. This has been the situation ever since we came to faith in Christ.

Even if the world has new beginnings as seasons change and fall projects start up, we have always been this new creation in Christ. The world changes but we do not change in Christ, who is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Heb 13:8). Ironically, we remain just as new in Christ as we have always been in the past. Both the blessings and the challenges that come and go will always be faced by us who have been renewed in Christ. Therefore, let us enter into new opportunities to learn and grow in the faith as those whom Christ has prepared for these tasks. And also, in the same knowledge of Christ preparing us for what is to come, let us make the decisions we need to make as they arise.





What is an "acolyte"?

The acolyte is the person (or persons) who lights the candles before the service. The word acolyte comes from the Greek word *akolouthos* which means "follower." In English, the word acolyte sometimes means "attendant."

Why do we use acolytes in the Church?




Acolytes have always been an important part of worship. For centuries, acolytes have attended to the service of God's people by helping the pastor in many different ways. In our churches today, acolytes primarily serve by lighting the candles. Acolytes wear robes and sit apart from the congregation because they are helping the pastor to serve God's people during the service. Wow! What an important job!

Parents: During the Divine Service, point out the acolyte to your children. If they are too young at the time, encourage them that one day they will get the opportunity to be an acolyte. Remind them that being an acolyte is a very important job for children to have in the

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church.
