From the Pastor

We have come to the month of October and the celebration of holidays inside and outside the Church, such Thanksgiving as Reformation Day. The latter celebrates when the Gospel message was displayed in its purity after being veiled by the Law within the medieval Church. There were calls to things like pilgrimages and indulgences to secure or enhance one's salvation instead of the clear word of scripture; "by a single offering [of Christ crucified, God] has perfected for all time those who are being sanctified" (Heb 10:14). We do not depend on our works to save us or contribute towards our salvation or to sanctify us from spiritual fallenness (the first denied but the last two still affirmed by Roman Catholicism even today). Rather, we rely on Christ alone for our salvation and sanctification, who washes away our impurities by his blood in baptism and raises us to new life.

Having re-emphasized the Gospel in the Reformation, we can be thankful that we no longer have to put our emphasis on performing God's commands. We can put our good works in their proper place, which is joyful living out of the Gospel. The Law is not followed because we are trying to earn something from God. We follow the Law of the Lord out of thankfulness for all His blessings to us. Or, as it appears in the Formula of Concord as one of the Lutheran Confessions, "This trust and knowledge of divine grace renders us joyful, fearless, and

cheerful towards God and all creatures...and on account of this, man becomes ready and cheerful, without coercion, to do good to everyone, to serve everyone, and to suffer everything for love and praise to God, who has conferred this grace on him..." (FC SD IV.12)

Our thankfulness extends to every good thing the Lord gives to us, which includes the blessings of the harvest that Thanksgiving Day celebrates. The Lord gives us much for which to be thankful from nature itself: food, drink, shelter, clothing, and even other people. Everything we have in this world is a blessing given by our Creator who sustains us.

And as those whom He sustains, we thank the Lord where the natural and the spiritual blessings He gives coincide. Our congregation of Hope Lutheran is where the Lord blesses us with each other in a building made with hands in preparation for the temple made without hands where all believers will enter (Heb 9:24; 10:19-21). I am sure that it is not just I who is thankful that we, as a congregation, have moved forward in the decision-making process for the future of our congregation, as we did during our Congregation Meeting on Sept. 17th.

So, mindful of the divine blessings of God in His Church and the natural blessings on our congregation, let us be thankful this October for all the Lord continuously gives us.

In the Spotlight: Important Congregational Decision

Based on the thoughtful discussions, survey results, and the updates provided by the PPC, our congregation has made progress in charting our path forward. We've narrowed down our options to two compelling choices:

Option A: Path 1- Staying on Our Land and in Our Building

Under this option, we'll retain our cherished building and consider selling equity in our property to All Saints of Alaska Orthodox Church.

Option B: Path 2- Embracing a Fresh Start

Alternatively, we can choose to stay at our current location, albeit in a brand-new building. This would involve selling our property to a developer and purchasing unit(s) in the building to be constructed on-site.

But before making our final decision, it's essential that we reflect on the values that define us as a congregation. We must ponder the significance of our current building, examine our methods of evangelization, and ensure our financial stability for years to come.

The Decision-Making Process

In our collective journey towards a well-informed choice, our members recognized the need for additional information. Therefore, a motion was proposed and approved:

Motion: "To explore options for selling equity to All Saints of Alaska Orthodox Church and to seek three proposals from developers by January 15, 2024. These proposals will be presented to members at a special Congregation Meeting."

We believe that this exploration will guide us toward a decision that aligns with our values, secures our future, and strengthens our bond as a faith community. Stay tuned for updates as we embark on this path together!

We are blessed.

colored glass. These colored pieces may even have designs painted on them. Stained glass windows are a very important part of the church building.

Why do we have stained glass windows in the church?


Stained-glass windows add to the beauty of God's house, but that's not all that they do. These windows are designed to teach us. If you look closely at the windows, you'll find that most of them contain wonderful imagery. This imagery usually depicts stories from the Bible, different Christian symbols or different articles of the Christian faith; and it's all wrapped up in beautiful pictures made from colored and painted glass! What a wonderful way to glorify our Lord and to proclaim the Gospel!



After worship, be sure to walk around and look at the windows with your child. If there are windows with different themes, take a few moments each

week to discuss the individual teaching points of each window. Encourage your child to ask the pastor for help.
