#### From the Pastor

Genealogies are interesting tools for helping us understand ourselves through historical family members. For Israelites, genealogies were used more for knowing your inheritance from God. Christ's genealogy in Matt 1:1-16 more or less combines both these things (which I will bring up in my Advent sermon series looking to lesser-known figures of Jesus' genealogy).

Matthew's account of Jesus' heritage starts with Abraham; the reason being, Abraham received the promises of God, which would define the identity of God's people throughout all generations. The promises were: nations/Gentiles will be blessed, land will be possessed, and an everlasting inheritance will be received (Gen 12:1-3). We still look to these promises today through faith; we desire to be blessed with salvation, to possess the promised land of heaven, and to be given eternal life. And these things come to us by way of Christ. But Jesus' genealogy reveals many people undeserving of these promises.

Starting with Abraham himself, we see a person who doubted God's promise of a son to justify having a child by another woman and even lying multiple times about his wife being his wife. Next up is Isaac, Abraham's son, who followed in his father's footsteps by lying about his wife being his wife only for her to be taken for a time into another man's household. Following that was Isaac's son, Jacob, who played the part of a trickster much of his early life.

There are many other figures, most of whom are lesser known, in Jesus' line who are no less sinners than these famous forebears.

Our family lines are not different insofar as we are sinners who are descendants of sinners who are born of sinners, a lineage that goes back to the original sinners, Adam and Eve. But this is why Christ came in human flesh: to redeem our flesh from sin that we might receive the promises of God.

Jesus did not step into his genealogy because it was perfect but because it was sinful. That way he could lift up the people of the same flesh and blood through faith. But this, of course, was not intended only for the genetic descendants of Abraham. Christ taking on human flesh means he takes on all human flesh—all human descendants from all time. In Adam, all humanity fell into sin and death, but by the death to sin by the man Jesus Christ comes forgiveness and life to all humans who believe (Rom 5:15-18).

Heb 2:14 Since therefore the children share in flesh and blood, he himself likewise partook of the same things, that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, <sup>15</sup> and deliver all those who through fear of death were subject to lifelong slavery. <sup>16</sup> For surely it is not angels that he helps, but he helps the offspring of Abraham.

infant Jesus, the Lamb of God born long ago, is our Shepherd, our All in All.


