

## Pastor's Message

There are some transitions happening in our church. One of the most celebrated and public transitions coming at this time is Confirmation Sunday (June 2) where we welcome Fisher and Milo Novakovics to receive communion alongside all of us who have been catechized in the faith. They spent time poring over scripture and the Small Catechism to confess what we all believe and to receive the same body and blood as we do. This is a transition, of course, and not an end. They shift from living and celebrating the faith as those who were students hungry for the Lord's Supper into living and celebrating the faith as those who are being further strengthened and encouraged by Christ's forgiveness in this sacred meal. Confirmation does not mark an end to biblical study, nor an end to regularly attending worship, nor taking detailed notes of the sermon. Their study was a vehicle to drive them to do all these things in a greater context of clarity, just as it was for everyone else.

Similarly, Confirmation marks a transition for me from teaching the boys in a regular class to continue teaching the whole congregation... and keeping an eye out for any new opportunities. Christ's grace and instruction are always needed and welcome. Considering my Saturday mornings are now free, this might be a good opportunity to start a men's breakfast in that time slot come September. That has been brought up for discussion a number of times.

Another transition that is underway is the change of people on the Parish Planning Council and the various boards. This was the main subject of our last Congregation Meeting. If you take a gander at the list of those who are in the offices and boards, you'll notice a fair number of empty spaces. One thing for which to be thankful is that there are fewer empty positions after the meeting than before the meeting. (Consider those empty spaces as opportunities to insert yourself into helping the congregation.) At the end of the month, in the service on June 30, we will have an installation of all those who have been accepted at the meeting to officially enter their positions and begin carrying out their duties to the congregation.

Of course, as those who have been called to God's Church, all Christians have responsibilities to the Church, but we can transition from one responsibility to another as time, opportunity, and personal ability move on. Change is constant, ironically enough. However, we also know Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Heb 13:8). Whatever transitions we make and new challenges we face, Christ will always be present with us. His love for us will never change and his promise of grace will never fade away. Pray for all those making transitions that Christ be there for them: for the congregation, the boards, Milo and Fisher, and for yourself.

As our choir season comes to a close, I am reminded of the wonderful wisdom in Ecclesiates 3:1-8 (NKJV):

"To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven. A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck what is plante; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to cast away stones; and a time to gather stones; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to gain, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time of war, and a time of peace."

In 1965, the Byrds released their hit song 'Turn, Turn, Turn', based on this same Bible passage, and by doing do, they too recognized that life has seasons that we cannot ignore, but rather should embrace, and that wise is the person who recognizes there truly is 'a time for everything'.

It is now time for Belle Voci choir and the Chime Choir to rest for a summer break, after a season of offering beautiful music here at Hope Lutheran. To all the musicians, thank you.

The sewers of the Heart Pillows will take a short break after June 20<sup>th</sup> and will resume in September, the third Thursday of the month.




After June 15<sup>th</sup>, the weekly sewing group will also take a break for the summer, and if there is a continued interest it

### Make a Joyful Noise unto the Lord!

We at Hope have been treated to mostly monthly Reposes, or "Repose: 30 minutes of Meditative Music", for quite some time now. One is always pleasantly surprised by the variety of music and instruments, including voice, and each Repose's theme. The audience is sometimes encouraged to join in in singing the chorus, such as in the song, "I Just called to say 'I love you'" by Stevie Wonder, or repeat a verse, as in the Taizé "Come and Fill Our Hearts" during the May 25<sup>th</sup> recital.

That afternoon's theme was love. Instruments included voice, ukulele, piano, and chimes. The musical pieces ranged from Taizés to opera to traditional and modern folk songs. Composers included Puccini, Leonard Cohen, and S. Warner, whom we learned wrote, "Jesus Loves Me", as a poem to comfort a child.

Barbara Guidetti, our gifted music director, introduced us to the music and invited us to sing along in a way that set the mood to relax and enjoy these musical offerings. She coaxed the best out of the performers whom we know, by listening, had practised the pieces well, to the glory of God. Twelve people, of a wide agerange, held our ear today. All of this was presented in the sanctuary of our church, a place filled with the peace of God's love. Afterwards, we exited to the foyer and enjoyed homemade desserts, lively tea, and conversation with each other.

# What makes the Divine Service so important?


