

### Pastor's Message

The Tuesday morning Bible study had an interesting conversation about how new and available technology has increased certain problems (pornography addiction, exploitation of youth, etc.). The comment was made that, back in the 1950s and '60s, the church would not have talked about stuff like this-and not because the technologies in question weren't around at that time. Back then, controversial issues like these weren't really talked about despite their existence. The atmosphere was such that, "Christians don't speak about such things." However, our lack of addressing such things as the body of Christ in the public and congregational squares have allowed these issues to go somewhat unaddressed and largely unopposed.

Our church should be a safe space where Christians can feel comfortable bringing forward personal and social concerns to discuss in a loving manner. This can be done in large part during regular times of fellowship, such as over coffee following the worship service. We use it as a time to catch up with each other, but it can also serve to have hardhitting conversations about our lives as Christians out in the world. Casual conversations can address them lightly and heavier conversations can be held in Bible study or one-on-one with the pastor.

Looking to the events in this newsletter, I would like to give an example of one such conversation. It has been remarked to me that

Hope Lutheran has historically had little to do with non-Lutheran groups, but I preached at Living Hope Baptist Church's second anniversary service on Sept 15, and we are set help Street Hope Victoria-a nonto denominational Christian organization – collect drawstring bags for the homeless. Why engage with non-Lutherans? Because our congregation can use help spreading Christ's love to our community.

Does this mean we are compromising on doctrinal lines or now have open fellowship? No. Fellowship is determined by agreeing on (1) God giving grace through Christ, (2) that we receive this grace through Word and Sacrament, and (3) that the Office of the Keys distributes these things (i.e. а right understanding of ministry). While all three Hopes (Lutheran, Living, and Street) agree on the first point-which means we are all Christians-we disagree on the latter two. This means we cannot claim unity in worship (i.e. fellowship), but we can conduct the nondoctrinal aspects of the Christian faith together, such as giving charity. In my sermon to Living Hope, I mentioned this by saying we are not in fellowship, but we do agree on the Word, which I preached to the best of my ability, including the fact we receive grace through the Sacraments, which Baptists deny. Until the time we openly agree on these things, we pray with Christ that the Father brings unity to the entire Christian Church on earth (John 17:21).

#### October is Mustard Seed Month

The Mustard Seed operates the most accessible food bank in the greater Victoria area. It has provided roughly 600,000 pounds of food, beverages and hygiene products to families and individuals which equates to about 480,000 meals or 1,300+ meals per day!



October is a month of thankfulness and as we give thanks for what we have received, let us remember those who have less; the homeless and the hungry.

Throughout the month of October, we will be collecting donations for the Mustard Seed Food Bank. Monetary donations can be placed in your offering envelop and marked "Mustard Seed".

If you prefer to donate non-perishable food stuffs, they currently need the following items: sources of protein like peanut butter, canned fish (e.g. tuna) and canned meats (e.g. chicken, beef), healthy nonperishables (e.g. cereal, beans, pasta, canned vegetables and fruit), female hygiene products, toothpaste, and toilet paper.

#### Some Thoughts on Attitude

When we hear someone saying of someone else he or she "has an attitude", it is not exactly flattering; rather, it implies a somewhat haughty person, difficult to get along with. These days, people tend to be in a sour mood, squeezed by personal, economic, and political uncertainties, secretly quoting, "Nothing is certain except for death and taxes" (Mark Twain). Indeed, we live in tough times: after decades of relative peace and quiet, we had Covid and now have inflation, mortgage squeezes, a doctor shortage, and crowded ERs, as well as general belt-tightening, not to mention wars in Ukraine and Gaza and spreading unrest in the Middle East.

For the older ones among us who witnessed World War II, as well as the wars in Vietnam and Iraq, it is "déjà vu all over again" (Yogi Berra), but for the middle aged and younger ones, the situation may well look frightening, especially if they are not (yet) firm believers. So, what to do about it?

As Christians, we don't really have a problem; our faith ought to let us face everything the world can throw at us with calmness. Confidence in our Lord, who has accepted us in baptism as His children, who knows us completely (down to the number of hairs on our heads), and who has a plan for each of us, gives us that firm attitude. Even real or seeming adversity cannot weaken that.

So why not adopt, live with, and display that positive attitude? The Bible is full of helpful stories—think of David, Joshua, Joseph, and many others—and has many a saying for our comfort. For example, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart... and he will make your path straight" (Prov. 3:5-6) or Mark's exhortation: "Do not be afraid, just believe" (Mark 5:36), which sums it up rather nicely. And there are many more encouraging verses throughout to help us face what comes. Not only that, but we can strengthen other people's attitudes by "loving our neighbour" in the daily grind—a kind word to the cleaner who worked hours in dust or the cashier who stands all day—can do wonders, just to feel appreciated.

Whether our "glass is half-full or half-empty" is up to us to decide. With a positive attitude and a bit of humour thrown in and trusting in the Lord's help, that glass (our life) will get fuller, even if that is not apparent right away. In St. Paul's epistle to the Romans, we have a wonderful guide to take whatever may come: "We know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God." (Rom. 8:28). Thus, we really have nothing to worry about, and that should be reflected in our attitude, which we feel inside and show to the outside, which in turn should be noticeable and thereby encouraging to others.

For those in difficulties now, try it—a positive attitude will pick you up and help you deal with whatever is getting you down!

## Children's Corner and For Those Young at Heart

# Do Lutherans honour and remember the saints?

Yes. Remembering and honouring the saints is very "Lutheran." God's Word and the Lutheran Confessions teach that remembering and honouring the saints is a great thing to do.

## Why is it such a great thing to do?

The Apology of the Augsburg Confession, which explains what Lutherans believe, teaches that we honour the saints for three reasons. 1 Thanksgiving. When we honour the saints, we thank God for "showing (his people) examples of his mercy, revealing his will to save men, and giving teachers and other



gifts to the church." 2 Strengthening our faith. When we see how our Lord forgives the saints, we are "encouraged to believe that grace does abound more than sin." (Do you remember when Peter, one of the disciples, denied Jesus three times? Even the Apostles sinned and received forgiveness.) 3 "the imitation, first of their faith and then of their other virtues ..." We pray that God would keep us as strong in the faith as they were!



Explain to your children that we are not praying to the saints; we are simply honouring them on a special day in the Church Year. Remind them that when we die, we will be with our Lord in heaven, which is where the saints are right now.
